"Euossa, Euossa, use, rela sema, catah mala kanah leulia sage nalan. Ligie logie lazle logie. Ene mine mo, sah rah el me sah rah me," meaning it was translated this: "Jesus is ready to hear." "God is love."

The male members are called "brothers." "Brother" Howard gave an example of his inspiration along the line of the gift of tongues, and his tongue ran rapidly from both ends, the words coming so swiftly he could hardly utter them. In fact, they were like a mighty oratorical flood, and he waived his arms and hands and gesticulated as though he were reaching to the Gentiles and the Jews alike. He was speaking Hindoo, it was explained.

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
