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
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New Pediatrics, Family Medicine Units Open 9th Floor Hospital Dedicated With Open House

Last year on the first anniversary of the City of Faith Hospital's opening, the institution's Psychiatric Unit was announced. Just how do you top that? By opening two hospital units on the second anniversary, that's how.

On Nov. 1 Hospital 9 became the longawaited Pediatrics Unit and Family Medicine Unit. Pediatrics Chief Nurse Cathy Chess organized a colorful open house to commemorate the event, complete with streamers, surgical glove "balloons," cake and punch served in the new pediatric playroom. Dr. David I. Schrum, chief of Pediatrics, and Dr. Jon Calvert, chief of Family Medicine, took part in the festivities, as did prayer partners Ken Blank and Nancy Lile.

Evelyn Roberts was a special guest after she first visited the Psychiatric Unit, which was having a party of its own, in celebration of that anniversary. On both the 30th and 9th floors the wife of the City of Faith founder visited with patients and viewed the pediatric playroom mural, painted by longtime Roberts family friend, Ann Morgan of Chicago.

The Pediatric Unit opened with four patients and Family Medicine opened with seven. Hospital Administrator Joe Gunn said he foresees a growing need for these units as the City of Faith patient load increases.

The 9th floor dedication pushed the total number of beds open from 111 to 117.

COF Comes Through the United Way

With a 350 percent increase over 1983 pledges, the City of Faith's 1984 United Way Campaign has been declared a success.

COF employees pledged more than \$7,000 toward the Tulsa Area United Way's 40 community agencies and social service programs. That compares to \$1,544 raised by the institution the vear before.



Part of the success was due to an organized campaign this year, as opposed to the new employee payroll deduction program only.

Payroll deductions for the United Way begin with the first paycheck in January

and will be taken out of each paycheck, not just one per month, which has been this case before.

City-wide, the Tulsa Area United Way met 95 percent of its \$7,050,000 goal by the first of December.

Barnes told the media, "We flew this patient to Tulsa because the problem can best be evaluated by magnetic resonance imaging, which is a technology available only in a few places in the U.S." Lester said that the COF and Childrens Memorial are anticipating further cooperative MRI research with pediatric patients.

Grounds Crew Makes Good First Impression

"You mean weeds grow on Oral Roberts' land?" exclaimed a visitor who had stopped to chat with a gardener working around the Healing Hands sculpture in front of the City of Faith.

Yes, weeds grow even on Oral Roberts' land. Andy Hines, assistant grounds supervisor, said that if it weren't for his two-man grounds crew, the City of Faith would be far from the garden spot it is.

The gardeners, Doug Bizjack and Darrell Worthley, can be seen weeding in 100 degree weather or scraping snow in winter time twilight hours. Hines said they do the work of six men and they do their work "as unto the Lord."

"The partners have a lot invested in the City of Faith, " said Hines, "and it is up to us to keep it looking its best. Even the most beautiful buildings can look unattractive if the grounds are run down."

Many aren't aware of the challenges to keeping the flower beds in show-piece condition. Last year the crew battled flooding caused by water running off the atrium. Flower beds were ruined every time it rained until Worthley engineered a drainage system.

There is also a hot steam line running parallel to the River of Life that kills plant-life anywhere near it. The men designed rock beds for those areas where the heat was destroying the flowers.

Perhaps the most time-consuming foe in summer months is Bermuda grass. It takes one man hours to clear a small area of this beast. Hines, who is a specialist in chemical weed control, said that they will soon be using a herbicide which will attack the grass without damaging the broad-leaf groundcover. Oral Roberts Ministries will be the second group in the state to use this chemical for ornamental gardens, he said.

"It is easy to do a job when you have unlimited money and manpower," said Hines, "but what is exceptional here is that our two gardeners are doing the work of six and we are operating within budget." The men pray over their work and trust God to bless it.

Hines studied turf management at Purdue University and worked for a landscaping business for five years before moving to Tulsa to attend Rhema Bible Training Center.

"I never did make it to Rhema," Hines said. "I went to visit the Prayer Tower and the presentation of Oral's life, the Journey Into Faith, and it changed my life. Before that time I knew nothing about Oral Roberts. I applied for work here and got the job on the grounds crew 30 minutes after it had opened up." ' Bizjack had been working in Tulsa with his brother's landscaping company when his wife encouraged him to apply at the City of Faith. "I've grown a lot in the Lord since I've been here," said Bizjack, "and I really look forward to the weekly devotional with Dr. Buskirk."

Worthley left a farm after 32 years in Minnesota to come work with the ministry. "It is inspiring to be here," he said, "and I thoroughly enjoy the visitors we meet from all over the world."

The gardeners agree that the most rewarding part of their job is directing newcomers and answering questions. And what's their greatest reward?

"We thrive on the compliments people give the gardens!" they said.

Speech Pathology Proving to be Popular Addition

It was just over a year ago when speech pathologist Connie Teter came to the City of Faith to begin working with patients. Since then the lives of dozens "from ages 4 to 65" have been changed through this COF service unknown to many within the institution.

Teter tells of one boy who was referred to the City of Faith because he couldn't speak well. His sentences sounded strange and his words were slurred. Because of a chronic ear infection, the child never heard correctly, thus his speech was just a reflection of how he heard the world around him. A City of Faith physician correctly diagnosed the problem and referred the child and his parents to Speech Pathology.

Teter is working with the child now, using various therapy techniques, including drill material. She also has designed a program for the parents so they can complement the City of Faith therapy with a similar program at home. Each therapy session is also observed by the parents via a one-way observation window.

"We start with new patients by first analyzing the problem with comprehensive, diagnostic evaluation," said Teter. "We look at all perimeters of speech," she continued, "including the patient's language, articulation, voice quality, fluency, particularly their hearing." Then Teter determines the best program of therapy that addresses specific problems that may be found.

Most of Teter's clients are outpatients from the Tulsa area and referred to Speech Pathology by a physician. Teter says that she is beginning to work with a number of cleft lip and palate patients who are referred by COF plastic and reconstructive surgeon Dr. Lewis Thompson. She is part of the multidisciplinary Craniomaxiofacial-Oral Anamoly Center team, which treats infants who suffer from birth defects or traumatic injury of the head and neck area.

The Speech Therapy Service is overseen by Dr. Richard E. Carlson and will soon be moving from Clinic 4 to Clinic 11, where Carlson's ear, nose and throat practice is located.

Teter, a graduate of the acclaimed Institute of Logopedics at Wichita State University, said that one exciting development in City of Faith Speech Pathology is a new service to area private schools. Teter will be coordinating speech and hearing screenings for students at Life Christian Schools this month. "And this is only the beginning of a new City of Faith outreach program to many private schools throughout the area," she said.

Knight, Barrett Stand Out in Tulsa Run


It was a beautiful day for a race and over 8,000 runners, including a team representing the City of Faith Fitness Center, converged downtown for another world-class Tulsa Run.


